

LEAD IN SOIL POLICY FOR HOMES BUILT PRIOR TO 1978

We decrease possible lead exposure from soil in our homebased child care by:

- Regularly checking the condition of our home's exterior paint for signs of chipping, cracking, or peeling.
- Testing any bare soil around our property for lead contamination OR making sure all bare soil is covered with mulch, plantings, or grass.

We also reduce lead dust and dirt levels indoors by using healthy best practices.

NOTE: Lead in soil is a common source of lead in and around homes. Lead may also be present in paint, drinking water, foods, candies, spices, pottery/dishes, cosmetics, toys, jewelry, traditional medicines, painted furniture, other consumer products, and other sources, including exposure to lead associated with certain jobs or hobbies.
